

The Ministers' Reflections

From Revd. Malcolm Hickox & Deacon Yasha Mashoko

Over the last year various events have caused changes to take place in the general life of Fulwood Methodist Church. These changes have challenged people to adapt and encouraged them to work collaboratively with each other and with members of the wider Circuit. Extended periods away from ministerial duties for both of us serve as an example. We have benefited from these extended periods, Yasha on maternity leave for most of last year and Malcolm on a three months sabbatical at the beginning of this year. We are grateful to the church not just for making these possible, but also for the support we received over those periods. This report also gives us the opportunity to express our thanks to those who covered our areas of responsibility in our absence - other members of the Circuit Ministry Team, the Church Stewards and a variety of folk in the Church. Yasha's maternity leave resulted in a new addition to her family, Kuda, who celebrated his first birthday in March this year. Malcolm and Christine spent the first six weeks of his sabbatical in New Zealand visiting family members they had not seen for years, or in several cases, had never met. It also provided an opportunity for some travel and meetings with Ministers of the New Zealand Methodist Church. Free from diary commitments, he was able to spend some more time back in this country with other family members and explore two aspects of particular interest for our Church - the Christian education and nurture of children and 'open' youth work with young people from the local community.

Once again this annual report gives a 'snap shot' of the last year at Fulwood Methodist Church and highlights the diversity and quantity of activities which take place each week on the Church premises or elsewhere in the name of the Church. Many of these activities have 'taken off' in recent years due to the refurbishment of the premises and one of last year's great achievements was the closure of the Church's Development Fund as the last outstanding debt was repaid, a year ahead of schedule. In thanking those who made this possible our small group of fund raisers must come top of the list. Their tireless efforts over such a long period demonstrated a wonderful commitment and has been an inspiration. It is a tribute to their work that many of the activities they initiated as fund raising events have now become part of the Church's outreach programme, greatly valued by many outside the church. These will continue, but under the oversight of the Church Outreach Group. At the same time there has been a desire to continue with some of the social activities and with this in mind we have been trying to recruit a small group to coordinate future events. The other individuals who should be acknowledged are those who made interest free loans, saving the Church significant interest payments and others who increased their giving specifically for the Development Fund. To all of them we offer our gratitude.

The last year has seen significant growth in a whole variety of groups and activities. All our adult fellowship groups have seen new members join from outside the church. Several of our uniformed groups have had to restrict the intake of new young people as they have reached their maximum numbers and the Friday evening youth clubs have seen extraordinary growth in numbers. Part of the success of the youth clubs has been due to a new teamwork approach from our volunteers and the extra leadership made possible due to a partnership with Preston Youth for Christ and the services of one of their youth workers. Yasha has also been spending time going round the Circuit observing the work done with families in neighbouring Methodist Churches, in order to develop Fulwood's ministry to families. Your prayers and support will be appreciated as we seek to further the work of the various church groups. At the same time we have seen an increase in the number of local people making use of the activities and refreshments in the Willow Grove

on weekday mornings. All of this activity is an affirmation of the vision of those who planned the development scheme and had the courage to enable the Church to step out in faith with a £1M refurbishment project.

The challenge of the growth in Church activity is to make sure that we have sufficient volunteers to sustain the work and there are signs that several of our teams are becoming overstretched. Our administrative support also needs to be fit for its task and in the last eighteen months we have been attempting to refocus the work in new teams. The Finance and Property Groups are now well established and a newly formed Publicity Group is helping to co-ordinate a range of activities. With the success of the Theatre Visits Group additional administrative support is now needed for their activities, but at the same time income has increased from the group. As a result the Church Council has agreed to create a part-time Church Administrator post (nine hours per week) to support the Theatre Visits Group and undertake general administrative duties for the Church. This will be funded by a contribution from the Theatre Visits Group and from General Church Funds. We hope to have someone in post by the beginning of July. Whilst this will provide assistance in one area, we are still concerned about the difficulty we have in finding members to serve as Church Stewards and in a number of other vital roles in the Church. Each January at our Annual Covenant Service we are encouraged to reflect on how God might be calling us to offer our time and talents in service within the church and the community. We would ask all who read this report to reflect prayerfully on what they might be able to offer as part of their discipleship.

Whilst this report has its focus in the life of Fulwood Methodist Church, we are conscious that members are involved in a host of charitable activities in the local community. Several make a very significant contribution to the Churches Together help desk at the hospital, the drop-in at Central Methodist Church and the work of Methodist Action North West, to name just three projects. This report provides the opportunity to acknowledge their service and also for us to thank everyone who contributes in any way to the life and witness of our Church. A special word of appreciation must go to our Church Stewards and to Sue Penrith, our Pastoral Secretary, who with us make up the Church Leadership Team. Without their commitment and their personal support for us, we would not have been able to undertake all that has been expected of us in our ministry.

We thank the ministers especially for leading the Wednesday Morning Communion Service, which also gave them a huge insight into our community work each week. Thankfully no major problems arose during this period!

We welcomed Malcolm and Christine back over the Easter weekend and they have come back refreshed and encouraged in their ministry among us.

Following her maternity leave we welcomed back our Deacon, Yasha, in December. She is now back to full health, (although kept on her toes by Vimbi and Kuda!) and has enjoyed being much more involved and active within the life of the church. Yasha is working particularly with the children, youth and young families of the church and is making contact with schools in the area too. She is still in her Probationary years before ordination so she has to study alongside her work within the church.

The role of Steward is a very rewarding one and we work as a team to support each other. We provide support for the ministers in their role and assist with the leadership of the church through the Church Council. We do need to appoint new Stewards so please consider prayerfully if you could offer yourself to this role. If we were a few more in number then the load would be more evenly shared. If you would like to know more of what we do please ask us – we don't bite!

Church Life

Church Life Group

The Church Life Group has again had a full and worthwhile year. All the existing church groups seem to be doing well and there is a variety of activities available for all age groups. The youth leader group are continuing to meet to discuss their successes and issues surrounding youth work.

The **Child Friendly Church Award** is still on hold until we receive further guidance from the District. It is then hoped Yasha will carry this forward.

Development of Spirituality and Discipleship - This is still in its early stages. We have regular café style worship monthly on Sunday evenings and the Alphabites Group is now well established in the life of Fulwood. Over the year a book club has also started. It is hoped that the co-ordination of this important area will develop over the next few months.

Formation of Social Committee/Group - This exciting role is still waiting for someone to come forward. We still continue to have an active social life within the church.

Harvest – The Harvest weekend was used as a time for us to celebrate clearing the debt on our Development fund 'Building Together'. It has been a long and often challenging time, but now as a church and a community we can celebrate and reap the benefits of God's vision.

Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Appeal - This appeal again was very well supported, we donated over 200 boxes. Many thanks to all of you who supported this worthy cause.

Toy/Gift Service – This service was again very well supported but we still only had two local charities, Parkinson House and Surestart. Some toys were sent to a Lancaster Methodist church where the gifts were used for outreach in a deprived area. Again any ideas of local charities would be gratefully received. Thank you to everyone who co-ordinates and supports the invaluable work within our church - without you the church we know would not exist!

Prayer Table - This is now in situ in church. Please encourage people to use this as a focus for prayer. You can also use the prayer book/tree for prayer requests but please

read the guidance before adding names.

The position of Church Life Co-ordinator will become vacant at the end of May as I step down. I encourage you to pray about this important role. Thank you to everyone who has contributed and support ed the meetings during the year.

Worship

We have enjoyed a variety of styles of worship over the past year. These have included all-age parade services, café-style evenings, Taize liturgy, Compline, informal evenings, songs of praise, seaside and garden services, in addition to our 'normal' services. We have been well served by Yasha, the Circuit ministers and local preachers, especially during Malcolm's sabbatical. We are extremely fortunate in having three organists, two keyboard players, and the 316 Band to provide a range of music, and despite declining numbers the choir continues to lead the singing, including an occasional anthem. The band and choir joined forces for Remembrance Day and the Carol Service, which was much appreciated.

Our communion services alternate between receiving at the rail and 'take-round' distribution. Malcolm has used a great number of different liturgies from all over the world. The evening communions are held at the URC, and are quieter and more intimate. The Wednesday communion has been led mostly by Malcolm but also by the Circuit ministers, and is a very valuable part of our Church's life of worship and prayer.

My thanks to the Worship Stewards, who support the Church Stewards in the smooth preparation for the services; the Communion Stewards; the musicians; the team of sound operators; all the people willing to read and participate in dramatic presentations; the welcomers; and the coffee servers. You are all an integral part of our worship team. But please – more volunteers are always needed!

Sunday Club

The Sunday Club has had to meet many challenges over the last few years and these have necessitated a complete review of our purpose and the way we support children on Sundays to learn about Christianity and faith. There are currently about 35 children and young people on the database although the weekly attendance averages considerably less than that. Patterns of attendance have changed completely so that very few children or families attend every week. This in turn affects the content of the Sunday sessions as there has to be more repetition of key learning whilst ensuring variety, activity and fun. Each week Sunday Club is organised into two groups – under and over five - although different levels of activities are prepared for each session relevant to the different developmental stages. The advantage of this format is that children and young people are able to choose from a range of different activities; this allows the older ones to do more practical things if they wish and the younger ones can choose to participate in discussion topics.

Over the last year we have talked about several themes –'Prayer', 'the Church Year', 'Easter', 'Old Testament Figures /Jesse Tree' and 'This is me'; the latter is one of the more popular themes as it can be studied at so many different levels and is relevant to all. We were also able to include some singing in this topic with the help of Christine Hickox. A further development this year has been the provision of activities for young children during Parade / Family services as it was felt that some of the under 5s found staying in the whole service too difficult. This has been very popular with both children and parents.

Help would be appreciated with these activities. The growth area in Sunday Club is with the under 5s and numbers are quite buoyant compared to a few years ago. This year we intend to:

- Re-write our mission statement and prepare information about Sunday Club for the church website.
- Continue to develop the way we work with a mixed age group, particularly devising challenging questions for the overs 11s to help them think more deeply about topics whilst giving them opportunities to participate in craft activities.
- Contribute to the church application for the Child Friendly Church award.
- Work with parents to maximise learning and experiences.

The demands of such flexible provision are challenging and time consuming. We are firmly committed to providing the best possible learning for our young people and are lucky to have such a team of dedicated leaders who spend considerable amounts of time every week to realise this ambition. We continue to need the support and prayers of the whole church family to ensure this is truly a child friendly church.

Pastoral Care

During Revd Malcolm's sabbatical, we as a Church family have been supported by Deacon Yasha and all members of the Circuit Staff. They have taken Sunday worship and the Wednesday Communion Services and also taken meetings and supported the Stewards of the Church. This support has been appreciated.

Our Church family has diverse pastoral needs and expectations. These we try to meet in numerous ways and by many people both Ministerial, Pastoral carers and the Church family. Confidentiality is important and there are times when people have been upset by what hasn't been done when the family have asked that no-one is told of a situation or they don't want visitors.

Following this meeting the following topics were suggested, to be covered as a way of helping us understand different problems and how to address them. The topics being Mental Health issues, Loneliness, Bereavement, Listening Project and End of Life Care.

The Prayer life of this Church is important. We continue to have the Prayer chain, a Prayer Table and a Prayer Book where needs or situations which need prayer may be written. This book is then taken into Wednesday Communion.

Appreciation is given to all, who continue to share in our Pastoral Care in so many different ways.

Theatre Visits Group

Other Groups

Activities for Families, Children & Young People

Toddlers' Club

We currently have 144 children on the register with several more in the pipeline. Our average attendance is 45 which is quite a nice number for us though it keeps the toaster very busy! As well as toys we have a regular singing session at the end of the morning

and frequently have a craft table where the children use play dough or make things to take home.

120 families are in contact with the Church through Toddlers' Club and most weeks we see new people coming along to give us a try. About half of those who visit us for the first time will continue to attend. As new folk arrive the older children tend to leave to go to preschool or nursery so our numbers remain fairly stable. Our finances are good, we are able to buy new toys when necessary and are also in a position to make occasional donations to the Church.

We are well staffed with seven of us regularly helping and a few we can call on to help out when we are short. All who help out thoroughly enjoy doing so, it is a great joy to watch the little ones setting out on life's journey.

Escape and Youth Club

Both Escape (juniors) and Youth Club (seniors) have had to adapt to a lot of change this last year. Change in the leadership, change in the roles of the leadership team and change in the culture of the groups, particularly the seniors. Following some challenges faced with certain members of the previous Youth Club, which resulted in a significant decline in attendance, the group was closed in the late Spring of 2014 while Escape, continued. A small group of girls, who had been very regular at the Youth Club were invited to assist with Escape so as to maintain contact with them. Towards the end of the summer term it became clear that there were about twelve members of Escape who would be moving up to Secondary School in September and would therefore be too old for that group. After careful thought and planning it was decided to re-launch the Youth Club in September with those twelve young people forming the core membership. Part of the time in the early sessions was spent involving the young people in shaping the style and content of future sessions. Since then, the group has grown rapidly with 70 registered members and a weekly average attendance of about 25 - 30 youngsters.

Escape has maintained steady growth throughout the year with new children registering membership almost every week. At the end of May there were just over 100 registered members, with a weekly average attendance of 55 - 60. We recently took the decision to close the membership until further notice, as we have reached our capacity. As the group is so popular, we are currently exploring the possibility of having a waiting list, and developing new strategies to ensure a smooth week by week running of such a large group of children.

The change in leadership originally began with the recruitment of Stuart Johnson, a Youth Worker from Preston Youth for Christ, to cover Yasha's leadership role during her maternity leave. This partnership has continued since Yasha returned, as it was recognised that with the additional members the joint leadership of Yasha and Stuart added value to the running of the two groups. Over and above this, the team of volunteers have shown a great level of commitment, taking on greater responsibility in decision making, planning and running the groups. The time commitment given can only be admired, so I take this opportunity to thank the team for all their hard work and commitment. Without such dedication we would not be able to run such successful open youth work. Out of the weekly subscriptions paid by the children, Escape and Youth Club have been able to purchase a new television and a table football game to share with other groups within the Church. We are proud to have been able to offer these items to the Church and hope that other groups will benefit from having these resources as much as we have.

Crèche

Our Sunday crèche facility continues to evolve as we seek to meet the needs of families with babies and toddlers in our Church. Church Outreach

The Outreach Group continues to work hard to make connections with our local community and work to support Christian outreach nationally and across the globe.

World Church

Ali Birkett has led our World Church group and continued to keep us up to date with what is happening in the Methodist Church worldwide. Throughout the year we have responded to special pleas for help from our District World Church Partners. The devastating Ebola crisis in Sierra Leone has affected staff at the Nixon Memorial hospital, and the Red Rose Training Centre was closed for many months due to the epidemic. Papua New Guinea was hit by a volcanic eruption which caused major disruption in many areas. We were able to send support to help the clean up of the vegetable garden at the Methodist Ministers' training college which provides food for the local area as well as the students. The Principal of the college is Revd Garo Kilagi who was a Mission Partner in our District a few years ago.

The Toilet Twinning project caught the imagination of all the groups in the church and to date we have twinned at least 25 toilets across the developing world, and money is still coming in. Thank you to Anne Garsed and Lesley Birkett for organising and encouraging support of this worthwhile project.

Christian Aid

At Christmas we were encouraged to take home a plate to place on our dinner table, remembering those across the world who would not have enough to eat. In Lent we screened the film Hunger for Justice, which highlighted the plight of Christian Palestinians in Israel who have been marginalised and displaced over the past years so that they are finding it harder and harder to earn enough money to survive. The house to house collection continues and unlike many other charity collections is still well supported by households in our area.

Church Project

For many years the Church has supported fundraising for charities locally, nationally and internationally. As well as raising money we have always tried to provide information about each charity. Whilst the Church redevelopment was ongoing we set aside 5% of all money raised through fundraising activities to give money to the Church Project. Now that our building debt has been paid, we needed to find a new policy for continuing this kind of support. The Church Council has agreed that we will donate 10% of the money raised through the Church's 'outreach events', namely: Welcome Wednesdays, Farmers Markets,

Table Top & Plant Sales, Craft Fair and Craft & Book Stalls, and the catering associated with these events. The aim is to raise £1000 each year for a specific project, with additional funding raising events being organised should the target not be reached from the 10% levy. We recently sent a donation of £1,000 to the Macmillan Organisation and canvassed the congregation for suggestions for future charities to support. Our new project will be raising money for Embrace the Middle East (formerly The Bible Lands Society) and information about this charity is now available.

Eco Church

We continue to work towards becoming an Eco-Congregation and we are now registered on this programme. This is an ongoing work and as a Church we need to support this very worthwhile scheme and look at how we work responsibly as a Church. We recently began using Fairtrade eco hand wash in the toilets.

Methodist Communications

Lesley Birkett continues to send out all the information on events which take place, locally, within the Lancashire District and further afield. She does this by email so if you do not receive her regular notes then please contact her to be added to her address list, lesley.birkett@yahoo.co.uk.

Local Community

Libby Stone co-ordinates our local community events. This work continues to grow and we now provide coffee on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday mornings to a wide range of local groups and others who just pop in for a chat. Numbers are increasing each week so if you would like to consider having your name on a rota to serve coffee please see either Libby or myself and we can share the load. Welcome Wednesday is an amazing success story with the whole of the Oak Hall and Willow Grove buzzing with activities all through the morning. Our lunches are so popular now that in order to make sure there is enough food, orders are taken during the morning! We regularly serve up to 40 hot meals with often only a few scraps left for the kitchen staff!

Fairtrade and Farmers' Markets

The Fairtrade stall is available on the second Sunday of each month and the Farmers' Markets take place on the fourth Saturday of January, March, May, July, September and November. Do remember to support these events as we continue to encourage everyone to think of where our produce and foodstuffs are sourced.

Christmas and other Activities

By popular request Lancashire Sings Christmas returned last year. We decided not to link in with our own community carol singing, but encouraged people to join with other venues around the Circuit. The event will take place again this December so watch out for the date and venues if you want to be part of this joint event with BBC Radio Lancashire.

We had a good response to our appeal for singers to join us singing carols around the residential homes on two evenings. Our visits are always well received and it was much easier with many more voices to swell the throng. We are looking for someone to liaise with the homes before our visit this year. Sue Penrith has done this for many years and we thank her for all her hard work. If you think you could take this on please contact Sue or myself.

The Friendship Lunch was much appreciated by those who attended although numbers were smaller than past years. This is an opportunity for anyone who finds themselves

alone over the Christmas period to share a meal and entertainment with others from both inside and outside the Church.

In February we held a heat of the Rosemere Bake Off. Although this was quite a small event several people surprised us with their talents for baking. We had offerings from a wide range of the congregation from the youngest to the oldest and those who have been baking for years to someone who baked his first cake ever! Judging was very professionally done by Janet Lowes and Mary Fox and everything was sold off raising £300 for the Rosemere Cancer Trust.

Messy Church

This is reported upon in another place but I want to thank Delma and the team for all their hard work and commitment in organising these evenings. The numbers are increasing and on Good Friday morning over 75 people of all ages joined together for activities, hot cross buns and worship. Families are joining together for food, fun and fellowship and learning more about our bible stories through the activities provided.

However, none of the events above would happen without a lot of dedication from a small number of people. If you think you could offer to help out serving coffee or chatting with people even once in a while please speak to Libby or myself and we will make sure you are added to the rotas. Likewise if you have any new ideas of ways we can reach out to our local community please let us know.

Action for Children

Finally, £650.00 was donated to Action for Children from our special Christmas collections at the Church.

Property Group

The Property Group has met five times during the past year. Membership has remained the same except for Sue Penrith joining the Group in June 2014 as a representative of the cleaning group. Recent work by the Group and its members includes:

New equipment within the premises

• **Notice Boards**: Eight new notice boards have been purchased and fitted in the Willow Grove, the front porch and by the rear entrance, to meet the requirements determined by the Publicity Group.

- **Organ camera**: A camera and monitor has been fitted to the organ to give the Organist an improved view of the worship area and the PowerPoint presentations.
- Lighting in the choir/stewards cupboard: A suitable fitting has been provided.
- **Answerphone in the Vestry**: A triple phone system with answer phone has been purchased. The third phone would be used by the Church Administrator.
- **Telephone in the passage to the rear car park**: A shelf has been fitted next to the telephone, to make it easier to take messages.
- **Vacuum Cleaner**: A replacement vacuum cleaner has been purchased to meet the requirements of the Cleaning Team.

Repairs & maintenance within the premises

- **Heating**: One boiler kept lighting and tripping out. The sound deadening pad around the air intake had come loose and when the boiler went onto full rate the pad moved and blocked the combustion air. The flame detector saw an abnormal flame and so it tripped. The pads on both boilers have been re-fixed! The notice advising that radiators be left on I or II is to be revised. It will advise that radiators be left on I.
- **Modifications to the garage**: Two scaffolding poles, that straddle the garage, have been installed so that the Scouts can dry their tents.
- **Dado rails**: These have been fitted in various rooms to prevent the chairs damaging the walls.
- **Improved baby changing facilities**: Baby changing facilities have been installed in the Palm Room toilets.
- FMC Crossroads Centre sign at the front of the premises: A temporary white backing was fixed to the banner over the front doors to improve its visibility from outside. A permanent backing has now been purchased and installed.
- **Cleaning rota**: Additional help is needed to spread the load of keeping our premises clean.

Repairs & maintenance outside of the premises

- Floodlights: The floodlight in the car park has been repaired.
- Access through electronic front doors: The external handles on the doors have been removed, to prevent any inadvertent forcing of the doors.
- **Christmas Tree Lights**: The control have been modified so that the lights will stay on and not flash during worship.
- Hatching in the rear car park: Yellow 'no parking' hatching has been applied to the rear car park in the area extending out from the garage doors to make manoeuvring the minibus more straightforward.

Health, Safety and Security

- Lone Working Policy: The policy has been approved by the Church Council.
- **Incident Book**: Following a request at last year's Church Meeting, a form has been developed to record property defects so that action can be taken by the Property Group. The Incident Book is kept next to the Accident Book.
- **Portable (Electrical) Appliance Testing (PAT)**: All electrical equipment has been tested by the in-house team. In future testing will be on a 2-year cycle.
- **Security issues**: The key codes to the front and rear electronic access doors have been changed.

• **Provision of first aid equipment and consumables**: The scouts have agreed to review and top up the church's first aid kits.

Ongoing and near-future work

- Forthcoming quinquennial inspections: The quinquennial inspections are due in 2015. The Building inspection (which is a Circuit responsibility) will not be carried out until 2016 (the Circuit are re-organising these inspections). The Electrical System quinquennial inspection will be conducted in 2015 (this is currently the responsibility of FMC).
- West Chancel Window wall: Repainting of this wall will require scaffolding and will probably take more than a week to complete, in which case the scaffolding would have to be in place for at least one Sunday.
- Additional storage space: The Property Group are looking at providing new storage space in the Cedar Room by installing cupboards against the external north wall of the room.
- **Computer Projector**: A projector has been donated to the church. It is intended to mount it to the ceiling in the Cedar Room. It will be mounted so that it will project onto the south wall or a screen in front of the proposed cupboards.
- **Improvements to signage in the Willow Grove**: Two additional signs will be installed in the Willow Grove pointing to the Sycamore Room & Exit and Cedar Room & Toilets.
- **Portable ramp**: The Property Group are looking into the provision of a portable ramp for use in church to give wheelchair access to the Olive Grove (Chancel).
- Five Year Programme: A Five Year Programme of major property maintenance, repair and renewal expected in the near-to medium-term future will be developed, to support the Church's financial planning.

Finance Group

The financial year 2013/14 was very exciting for us as we finally paid off the last of our loans relating to the development of the church.

At 31st August 2014, we had £93,000 in the bank, which is similar to the balance at the end of last year, despite making £51,000 in loan repayments. This is due to the fact that income from donations and fundraising in the year was sufficient to cover our repayments.

Our general fund has grown by £8,523. As well as increased offerings, we have seen a growth in income from the success of initiatives such as Welcome Wednesday and other catering services, which contribute to our financial position as well as providing a much needed community service.

In the year, we have been able to increase our circuit contribution from £74,000 in 2012/13 to £80,000 in 2013/14. We had reduced our contribution in previous years as we had concerns over the affordability of the cost during our development. We should be proud that we are now able to contribute our fair share

This illustrates the increase in our circuit contribution.

Other expenditure reflects the increased catering costs, which are linked to our income growth in this area. The costs also include expenditure we were not able to allocate to other headings due to the handover of records from one treasurer to another. This will largely explain why there is also a corresponding reduction in repairs and maintenance and utility costs.

Overall, the main reason for the reduction in total cost is due to us paying all of our grants and donations out of restricted funds this year (see notes below).

Note 3 - Transfers

The transfer of funds into the General Funds reflects the transfer of £51,500 of funds from the development fund to the general fund to match the loan repayments made in the year. A further £600 was transferred from internal groups, in order to contribute to the running of the church. It also includes £6 of interest earned on the endowments.

These transfers were offset by a transfer of £11,192 to the grants and donations fund (see overleaf).

Restricted funds

As well as the balance on our general fund, the bank balance includes balances from our restricted funds. These are the funds which we hold for a specific purpose and cannot be expended on the day to day activities of the church. These are summarised below:

Our focus in 2013/14 was to support Ted as he took on his new Treasurer role. Each meeting, we discuss the financial position compared to budget.

You may also be aware that we have introduced a safe. This enables everyone who handles cash to leave money in a secure place for collection and banking. Please ensure that any money posted into the safe is in an envelope with a clear note to say what it relates to.

We have identified and closed a number of old, unofficial bank accounts. These old accounts had been set up in the past by various church groups. It is important that we, as a church, only keep money in our main accounts. That way, we can account for the balances.

Looking ahead, we are keen to strengthen controls over any money we collect on behalf of external charities. We are proposing the following new controls:

- Stewards will decide which external envelope collections will be allowed in church each year and when. This is to ensure we do not ask people too often for money. If you are keen for a charity you support to be considered, please let me know.
- For each collection, we will asked a named individual to take responsibility for accounting for the money collected.
- Anyone collecting money in other ways, such as retiring collections or sponsored events, please can you place all money in the safe to ensure it goes through the proper counting, banking and recording controls.
- On no account should anyone take any cash off church premises.

Finally, we are in real need of further support with some of the administration tasks needed to keep the financial records for our church. If anyone feels able to help, please let me know.
