RESOURCES GROUP

CHURCH ACCOUNTS

The accounts referred to in this report are for the half year, ending February 2012

We are still experiencing some difficulties in profiling costs given the lack of historical data however overall the position is becoming more encouraging. We continue to meet the repayment terms of the loan and income is close to expenditure. Actual income is slightly down on that projected however the work of the Finance group is most appreciated; a further update will be provided by them and further actions are planned to round off their activity. A significant bequest has been received and all funds have gone to pay off the debt. A budget of £4,000 has been set aside to cover Guild and Centenary events. We will also assist with The Big Lunch, planned for 3/6/12.

DEVELOPMENT SCHEME

The accounts as ever provide a detailed exposition. That due repayments have been made is again due to the phenomenal efforts of the Fundraisers. The group once again urge all members to continue to support this outstanding work in every way they can. Given our confidence that the June payment can be made the debt at the time of the Centenary in September will be c.£67,000. This is a truly excellent effort and we should all be mindful of the opportunity we therefore have for another push towards the finishing line; plans are under development for such an effort.

ROOM HIRE

Room Bookings remain a valuable source of income and our thanks once more go to Barry. A number of long term bookings are confirmed. The PMA have "outgrown" the office space they leased from us- they will pay to the end of May. The Group congratulates them on this success and continues to wish them well. The Group has postponed a decision on the future of this space until the new minister had had chance to express a view.

PREMISES

Heating, the front doors, the need for maintenance provision and the state of the tarmac at the front of the church are all being addressed. Action has begun to ensure the church is in excellent condition for the Centenary. The group wishes to again thank our cleaner Mr. Richard McClayforall his hard. In addition we express our sincere and warmest thanks and appreciation to Peter for his unstinting work in managing so many of the property issues with both patience and dogged determination. We are sure the whole church will wish to echo these sentiments.

The Farmers' Markets have been a great success over the last year and we will continue to hold them through the summer – watch out for the dates in the notices.

Another new venture has been the introduction of Messy Church. This is an opportunity for families to share in activities, food and worship and up to 40 people of mixed ages have joined in. Future Messy Church dates are 15th May, 19th June, 16th October and 29th November. Why not come along and try something new!!

The Tea Dances which are held monthly as part of W.W. have made a promising start. The income raised from the sale of lunches etc on Wednesdays goes into the Kitchen funds.

We have organised two social evenings since Christmas, both quiz nights, the last one being to raise money for the Guild expenses. It is because this is both our Centenary year and also the Guild year, that we have not arranged any major events. We realise that folk will have a lot on their plates this year. However, we are planning a "Come and Sing the Messiah" in September which will be run on similar lines to the John Rutter Day with folk coming to take part from outside the church family.

The bequest from the estate of Mary Rushworth of over £60,000 has been a wonderful boostto the Development Fund and we are delighted to be in the happy position of being able to meet the instalment payments of the debt.

The financial income is also growing.

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JUNIOR CHURCH

Junior Church continues to be effective and valued because of the commitment of the leaders who give their time and energy each week to ensure that the baptismal promises of the church are carried out. Attendance patterns have changed however and children and young people nowadays experience many pressures which may prevent them attending church on a Sunday each week: football, family commitments etc. It is therefore essential to see Junior Church as one aspectofour provision for children and young people and our work is complemented by OMGs and Messy Church. Although we plan our work in themes, each session stands alone as we cannot assume that the same children will have attended the previous week. This means that in Juniors and Seniors particularly, we have to constantly put the sessions into context and make no assumptions about previous knowledge. Not easy but necessary.

The themes we have been studying this year are 'This is me', 'Christmas', 'Prayer', 'the Church year / Lent', and 'Stories Jesus told'. Probably the most successful topic was 'this is me' based on Psalm 139 as it appealed to every age group from Beginners looking at all the things they could do, to Seniors questioning their identity and relationship to God. At certain points we have been able to use the paintings from the Methodist Art Collection to stimulate thinking about a topic. Throughout the themes we have appreciated the support of Peter both in the planning and his willingness to link our work with that of the adult 'learners' in the church.

Although the pattern of attendance has changed, the number of children and young people who are 'touched by the work' remains almost the same and we still need extra help with each of the four groups. We try to ensure that there are always 2 adults with each group as this is best practice from a safeguarding perspective and leaders teach for one or sometimes two Sundays a month. Obviously the more leaders we have, the less demand is put on individuals and we need members of the church to seriously consider whether they could offer to help once a month. Please have a word with any of the leaders to find out more about the work.
